Where did the time go? How often do you ask yourself this question? Teachers start asking themselves this question beginning in March, and really start panicking in April! The third and fourth graders have been so busy this year! Third and fourth grade years are pivotal years for any child. Learning to read with fluency and confidence serve as a foundation for the reading demands in later grades. Recognizing and understanding words will help our students read increasingly challenging stories and books and build knowledge about the world around him or her. By the end of the year, all third and fourth graders have made great strides in their reading fluency! We use Daily 5 during our reading block on a daily basis. The Common Core standards are met through Read to Self. Work on Writing, and Word Work. Academic standards are so important because they help make sure that all students are prepared for success in high school, college, or in the workforce. They help set clear and goals for students, parents, and teachers. Of course, high standards are not the only thing needed for our children's success. But standards provide an important first step — a clear roadmap for learning for teachers, parents, and students.

Reading is the foundation for all other areas of study. These include Math, Religion, Social Studies, Science, Art, and Guidance. Students participate in Daily 5 Math. They also take turns planning the weekly masses, visit Willow Dale nursing home, participate in the Living Stations and the Living Rosary, and learn how to lead the rosary. Third and fourth graders have been learning all about the different regions in our country. Of course their favorite region to study was the Midwest! They have also enjoyed learning about the solar system, living things, energy, and the human body in science. One area that makes our school so special is in the way students treat others. In guidance, we really focus on respect, responsibility, and character building. After such a full year of academics, I

The Many Adventures of Danbury Catholic 1st/2nd Grade 5th/6th Grade

The 1st and 2nd grade students have been busy learning throughout the curriculum during the 2014-2015 school year! The 1st and 2nd grade students have been mastering making predictions, asking questions, drawing conclusions, and comparing and contrasting through the CAFÉ/Daily 5 reading program. They have been playing more partner math games and connecting math to real life in math writing through our Saxon/Daily 5 math. The students are also learning all about the earth's geography, pioneers, community, and economics in social studies; the human body in science; prayers in religion; the six pillars in guidance; and a study on colors in art. Besides these basics for their grade level, the students have enjoyed their participation in special occasions such as the MVAO Marching Band Visit, Red Ribbon Week, IPTV's Martha Speaks and Odd Squad specials, 100th Day of School, Catholic Schools Week, Dan Wardell Reading Road Trip Visit, and much more.

However, there is one particular learning process that the 1st and 2nd graders enjoyed above all the others during this school year. We recognized Veteran's Day by reading the book America's White Table by Margot Theis Raven. A little-known tradition to the outside civilian world, "the white table" originated during the time of the Vietnam War as a symbol for the remembrance to service members held prisoner of war or missing in action. Solitary and solemn, it is the table where no one will ever sit. In the story, as a special gift to her Uncle John, Katie and her sisters are asked to help set this white table for dinner one night. When Mama explains the significance of each item place on the table, Katie comes to understand and appreciate the depth of sacrifice that her uncle and each member of America's armed services, may be called to give.

•"We use a small table to show one soldier's lonely battle against many."

"We cover a small table with a white cloth to honor a soldier's pure heart when he answers his country's call to duty."

"We place a lemon slice and grains of salt on a plate to show a captive soldier's bitter fate and tears of families waiting for loved ones to return."

"We push an empty chair to the table for the missing soldiers who are not here."

"We lay a black napkin for the sorrow of captivity, and turn over a glass for the meal that won't be eaten."

•We place a white candle for peace, and finally, a red rose in a vase tied with a red ribbon for the hope that all our missing will return someday."

The white table has been set across America in mess halls and at military events for almost 30 years. My husband of 18 years, Ben, who is a former United States Marine, visited our classroom to read this moving story to the students. Then, he assisted the students in the 1st/2nd grade classroom in setting up their own white table to help them understand the importance of remembering veterans on this day and every day in order to appreciate and honor our veterans. Led by the 1st/2nd graders, the students at DC also wrote




letters to veterans who previously served and are currently serving to express their gratitude for our freedoms that we enjoy today. This activity was definitely the favorite memory of the school year for us all!



It's that time of year at Danbury Catholic when the weather patterns are changing here is lowa. Metamorphosis is happening right here in Danbury as this article is being written. As we are closing out the 2014-2015 school year, we are simultaneously making plans for the new school year! I would like to share with you some of the metamorphic happenings at Danbury Catholic:

Danbury's Enrollment...this year reached 59 students PK-6! That is up from the 28 students that were part of the K-6 system 14 years ago. While we realize that the reason we are seeing an increase in enrollment is due to the work of many people and the work of many who go unnoticed and not publicly thanked, I would like to give thanks to all who play even the smallest part in helping Danbury Catholic spread the word about our Christ-centered, top-notch, educational program!!

Transportation ... is something that we have introduced most recently at Danbury Catholic. We now own a suburban driven by Benita Uhl, shuttling students from Mapleton to Danbury on a daily basis. Next year we have an Anthon family who will possibly need transportation to Danbury as well. The mileage on our suburban vehicle and the tires on this vehicle are seeing some wear and are in need of replacement soon. We have entertained the possibility of purchasing a smaller bus for transporting our 11-14 students from Ida Grove and Battle Creek, but have not found the right fit for our needs yet. With more and more students coming to us from the east, we may need to explore our options and review our financials to see if a bus would be possible. Currently, Danbury Catholic holds a contract with Siouxland Regional Transit System for our transportation needs in Battle Creek and Ida Grove.

Vesting.....financially in Danbury Catholic continues to grow. The MLTF program, which offers state of lowa residents a tax credit on their donations contributed to this program, has been a blessing for our school, reducing some of the tuition burden to families in the spring. For the 2014-2015 school year we raised over \$25,000.00 in donations for this program. This spring our families will be awarded tuition assistance totaling over \$250,000,00 which is sent directly to our school! If you are interested in learning more about this program, please call 712-883-2244 and ask for Mrs. Liechti. I would be more than happy to discuss this program with you. We also have seen more people interested in investing in annuity programs written through the Diocese of Sioux City, naming Danbury Catholic School as the beneficiary. The most recent percentages of return on these investments are pretty competitive and actually, depending on your personal situation, surpass other like annuities. Asking about either of these programs may be worth your call and may help us to continue to offer a Catholic education to children in the Danbury communities.

Staffing....Danbury Catholic is blessed with a great group of people who help us educate the whole child spiritually, emotionally, academically and physically. Our teachers, classroom para-educators, secretaries, school board members, community members and other vested families and alumni all fit within the Danbury Catholic's puzzle of ministry. If you are really observant, you have noticed we have an abundance of birds and 'critters' here all year long. We also have the seasonal migration as the weather changes.

I remember the first time I saw a bald eagle at a park along the Maple River near Castana. I was 40 something and not very observant, but what a thrill that was. I don't believe we had eagles in this area in the 50-60's when I was growing up.

Since then there have been many more sightings and my young grandchildren can spot them very quickly. The most recent ones are near the Maple River between Danbury and Mapleton, but we have a reliable source - an Ida County naturalist that there is an eagle nest between Battle Creek and Ida Grove along the Maple. I am sure we won't be as famous as the eaglecam in eastern Iowa that monitors the nest, eggs and hatchlings. Still, it is great, and the grandkids are excited about the nest. They have done some research (on the internetof course) and discussed it with our family bird 'expert' grandpa.

We don't have bird feeders in our yard because they are a nuisance in his garden all summer. We have to cover the strawberry patch with netting, but the robins still get more berries than we do. Speaking of robins, i recorded on my calendar the first ones were back here on March 9 this year.

A big part of our double lot in town is evergreen trees, shrubs, and wild flowers. Our back yard has white fencing with chicken wire - to keep the rabbits out of the garden. The area is beautiful year round but during the summer when everything is in bloom, especially the purple cone flowers, the bees and butterflies are really busy!

I suppose you have already guessed

- the seed catalogs have come in the mail and I am anxious for spring! Some of my perennial bulbs were showing green shoots in January when we had the warm spell. Then we had cold and snow and now a couple rainy days. The red tulips are in full bloom now. As I write this it is early April and I have lived in Iowa all my 'young' life and I know we can get hit with a snow and/ or ice storm anytime. I remember a late Easter one year when we had an ice storm on Good Friday that took down electrical power, and we missed all of the Holy Week and Easter church services. We had a big diesel generator at the farm for the house and the well for water to the livestock. We have a portable generator here in town for small electric heaters if necessary. Maybe I should'nt tell that, might have guests wanting to hang out here in event of storm! Bring non-perishable food items and your own sleeping bag-leave the movies at home. If you have a small gas grill that would help too!!!!!








Class photos taken during alumni reunion
